Pippa- For super reading in guided reading this week. You are becoming a fluent reader and it is lovely to see your confidence grow in your reading. Keep it up superstar!


Ask us about...

PE: Athletics

In athletics this week, we have begun to develop our sprinting starts. We have learnt that sprinters use a crouched stance at the start of a race to maximise force, enhance stability and reduce reaction time.







Science: Scientific Circuit Diagrams

This week, we have been drawing electrical circuits using the correct symbols and predicting whether or not the completed circuits would work. In order to do this, we used our knowledge of circuits having to be one continuous loop and we have had to think carefully about which way the battery is drawn too. We were incredibly impressed when we were able to make working circuits and think about how to challenge ourselves and draw parallel circuits!



French: Transport

In French this week, we have been expanding our knowledge of cognates (words that have similar root words in French and English). We have learned how to say several forms of transport in French including train, bus, hot air balloon and submarine.

Woodthorpe wrap-around care

We are delighted to be able to offer full wraparound support for our families. This starts from 7.50am and continues until 5:45pm daily. Our offer includes care for all of our children, from nursery to year 6. Nursery pupils must book wraparound care sessions through the nursery as, due to the childcare funding, they receive, the charges are different.

Breakfast Club: (7.50-8.50am) £4.20/session £3.15/siblings. Children have a wide range of breakfasts and also have the chance to play games with their friends or take part in a morning physical activity to really help wake them up.

After School Club: (3.15-5.45pm) £9.00/session £7.50/sibling. At after school club, children start the session by having a snack and completing a 'circle' activity. From this, pupils then have the option to complete activities with their friends, take part in physical activities or relax with a book or film.

If you are interested in our wrap-around care options, please pop into the office and ask for our wraparound care administrator, Caroline Young.

Support Via the Pupil Premium

Given the difficult times and changes to people's circumstances. If you feel that you might be eligible to claim 'Pupil Premium' for your child, we will be able to support you with items such as school uniform, breakfast club and daily school meals etc... Please email our school office admin@woodthorpe.elt.org.uk or call in person to discuss 01904 806464. You will need to currently be in receipt of one of the following:

- Universal Credit, (provided you have an annual net earned income of no more than £7,400, as assessed by earnings from up to three of your most recent assessment periods)
- Child Tax Credit, provided you are also not entitled to Working Tax Credit and have an annual household gross income that does not exceed £16,190 (as assessed by HMRC)
- Income Support
- Income-based Jobseeker's Allowance
- Income-related Employment and Support Allowance
- Support under Part 6 of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- · The guarantee element of Pension Credit

A run-on of Working Tax Credit - paid for 4 weeks after you stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit

Digital Parenting

As a school, we are always keen to promote online safety and would like to share this useful website—where you can access the latest copy of the Digital Parenting magazine and many other additional resources regarding internet safety. Online safety - WhatsApp

As our children increasingly embrace digital communication, it is essential to ensure that they engage with these platforms safely. A significant number of young people now use WhatsApp, a popular messaging application that allows users to send texts, voice messages, and images instantly. However, it is crucial to note that **the legal age for using WhatsApp is 13**. This regulation aims to protect young users from potential online risks, such as:

- Privacy and Data Security: WhatsApp collects personal information, including phone numbers and location data. While the app is encrypted, there's always a risk of data being exposed in the event of a security breach.
- 2. **Inappropriate Content:** Children might be exposed to harmful content, including explicit images, cyberbullying, or messages that are unsuitable for their age.
- Cyberbullying: With messaging apps like WhatsApp, children may face bullying through texts, images, or voice notes. Since WhatsApp is a private platform, this can make it harder for parents to monitor conversations.
- Addiction and Screen Time: Excessive screen time can negatively affect children's health, including disrupted sleep patterns, eye strain, and poor posture. Constant use of messaging apps can also lead to dependency.
- Stranger Danger: WhatsApp does not have the same level of monitoring as social media platforms. This means that children may be more vulnerable to contact from strangers or online predators.

These are just some of the reasons that, according to the regulations, children of primary school age should not have WhatsApp on their devices. That being said, we understand that many families allow their children to have WhatsApp on their devices at a younger age than 13, so we would ask that if this is the case in your household, that you support your child in using it safely.

We urge you to have open discussions with your children about the importance of online safety.

Encourage them to think critically about the content they share and the interactions they have on platforms like WhatsApp. Remind them to keep personal information private and to report any suspicious activities or contacts.

Additionally, consider setting guidelines for their use of technology at home. Monitoring their online interactions and establishing healthy boundaries can significantly enhance their safety.

Together, we can foster a safe digital environment for our children while they navigate the online world.
